BAT YAM'S HOLOCAUST TORAH



How did it happen that a small Reform congregation on a barrier island off the coast of Southwest Florida, USA, acquired a Czechoslovakian *Holocaust Torah*?

The quest began in February, 1991, when 61 Sanibellians met at Sanibel Congregational UCC to develop plans and organize goals at what was the first congregational meeting. At the next meeting in March, 1991, under the skillful guidance of Leonard and Ann Arnoff, they set their goals and priorities and developed their mission statement. They voted for how they saw the congregation going forward. For the purposes of this article, three votes will be mentioned. There was a majority of votes for using their own Torah regularly at Shabbat services. They voted to hire a rabbi. They voted to affiliate with SCUCC and share the church building. One of the first decisions was to affiliate with the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, linking us to more than 850 Reform congregations in the USA and Canada.

Mel Bleiberg became the first President. Rabbi Karen Soria became the first Rabbi, but acquiring a *Torah* took a little longer. Mel was aware of "Holocaust *Torahs*." These were sacred scrolls which Westminster Synagogue in London had gathered from the disused Michle Synagogue in Prague, where 1,564 had lain in piles for more than 20 years. The Nazis had anticipated exhibiting them and other ceremonial objects as relics of a dead culture.

After the scrolls had been unpacked and numbered, a committee distributed them to synagogues around the world. They are on "permanent loan." Each scroll bears a brass tablet with a number corresponding to the number on a certificate that describes the origin of the scroll and any known particulars.

Mel made six telephone calls to Westminster Holocaust Museum, to the offices of the Memorial Scrolls Trust, requesting a *Torah*, all to no avail. He was told the congregation was too small. But when Ingaborg Mauksch, a Holocaust survivor and a member of *Bat Yam*, visited London and told her story, *Bat Yam* was allocated a Czech *Torah*, which came from Boscovitz, a city 100 miles south of Prague. Our *Torah* was written in the nineteenth century.

This became very personal for Ann Arnoff, as her family roots were in Prague. She and Leonard sent \$1,000 to transport the scroll from London to Miami. The *Torah* needed a cover, so Ann designed and needlepointed a special mantle for this special *Torah*. The mantle tells

a story. In the upper left-hand corner is a barbed wired fence and behind the fence is a barren tree, with one limb full of leaves. The tree is a symbol of the Holocaust and the barren limbs the loss of lives, but the living limb gives the Torah new life. There is a yellow hibiscus to symbolize the tropics where we live. The Star of David sparkling in gold thread lies on the sand. Ann said this meant Jews have found their place on this island. Four shells lie on the beach: the butterfly shell, which commemorates the death of the Arnoffs' young daughter, who flew away too soon; the alphabet shell for her learned husband, Leonard; the junonia shell for her daughter, Susan; and the pink scallop for Ann. A great egret denotes man's inhumanity to animals. For a while, fashion dictated egrets were to be killed for their feathers. Floating in the water is the name Bat Yam.

The Yad was a gift from Ken and Henny Karasin, parents of our congregant Elissa. They had found it in a bazaar in Teheran in the late '70s. It was tarnished and neglected. They returned home and cleaned it, restoring it to its original beauty. They discovered it had been made between 1865 and 1890. A Hebrew name is inscribed on it, and they felt it probably belonged to a Russian congregation. The Yad's history is unknown, but it must be assumed that the original synagogue was destroyed. The Karasins felt it was appropriate to rededicate the Yad, as a symbol of a lost Jewish Russian congregation to complement our Holocaust *Torah*.

The Rev. Ran Niehoff received the *Torah* during the summer. After speaking to Mel, who was up north, he carefully locked it up in a cabinet in his church office. This is where it stayed during the summers when the congregants

went up north. Initially, Mel thought he would carry it back and forth, but the strong sentiments of Rev. Niehoff's convictions swayed Mel, who said, "That's no way to treat a *Torah*!" The kindness and the support extended to *Bat Yam* by SCUCC was the catalyst needed for the growth of *Bat Yam Temple of the Islands*.

When the season began, the ceremony of the rededication of the *Torah* occurred. It was held in the sanctuary of the church to accommodate members of both the synagogue and church congregations.

Mel and Shirley Bleiberg wrote a moving service with the help of Bernette Jaffee and Ken Karasin. The ceremony proceeded with Ann and Susan Arnoff presenting the Torah to Rabbi Karen Soria and the congregation of Temple Bat Yam. The Rabbi described the Torah and its history to the congregation. Mel Bleiberg and Ken Karasin walked down the center aisle of the sanctuary, unrolling the holy scriptures from the front of the room all the way to the back. The Rabbi requested those sitting on the aisle to step forward with their hands outstretched and hold up the Torah scroll as it passed them. Each guest cradled it in their hands so that it could be held with reverence and joy while words of consecration were pronounced. It was a moving moment and a "once-in-a-lifetime experience" for all present. Mel remembers, "There was not a dry eye in the sanctuary."

Prior to this wonderful occasion, a number of ties bound members of both congregations; but many agree with Mel who labeled that moment as the official "bonding" of our two congregations. We are grateful and appreciative of the church's role in our history.

The church allotted a corner of Fellowship Hall for the Ark. Irv Stein, a *Bat Yam* congregant, the architect of the Ark, had certain requirements to fulfil. The goal was a structure that safely stored and showcased the *Torah* scrolls, plus items used in services. The design should be reminiscent of Mt. Sinai (central to the story of Moses receiving the law in the Biblical tradition) – hence the "peak" toward which the Ark rises.

Upon completion, it was consecrated in Dr. E. Leonard Arnoff's memory at services on December 11, 1992, in Fellowship Hall. Our

historic *Torah*, together with another donated by Benno and Becky Kon, had found a home.

The Holocaust *Torah* was read for the first time in 56 years during the celebration of *Rosh Hashanah*, 1995/5756. Then as now, when the *Torah* is carried through the congregation on a Friday night, in Ann's words, "Remember it carries many generations of Jews and the memory of the Shoah."

Celebrating Earth Day's 50th

Wednesday, April 22, marked the historic anniversary of the first Earth Day, which took place in 1970. However, the emergence of the coronavirus necessitated a change of plans.

On Wednesday April, 22, church bells resonated throughout the islands from Saint Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church, as well as from Captiva Chapel by the Sea. Islanders were invited to ring their own bells or light a candle in unison from their own homes. Separately, they celebrated the Earth, together.

RABBI FUCHS REFLECTS

The coronavirus crisis has confronted us with circumstances few of us could have imagined only a few months ago. Our lives have changed – radically, but one look at the news, with people standing outside in frigid weather on long lines, waiting for food, or a test, spaced at least six feet apart, should let us know how blessed we are to be here in Southwest Florida.

The numbers of lives lost and afflicted stagger us. And the thousands on the front lines fighting the virus and caring for the sick inspire us.

Numbers? No, they are real people who could easily be our loved ones or ourselves. They are the embodiment of God's image, a sacred act of creation.

Poet Hannah Senesh, who parachuted behind enemy lines and was tortured and executed at age 23 for aiding the Partisans who resisted Hitler, wrote, (Ashrei ha-Gafrur in the original Hebrew) "Blessed is the Match."

Blessed is the moth consumed in kindling flame.

Blessed is the flame that burns in the heart's secret places.

Blessed is the heart with strength to stop its beating for honor's sake.

Blessed is the match consumed in kindling flame.

We offer our profound gratitude to all who have risked or given their lives so that the flames in others will continue to burn. Victor Frankl, the famous neurologist and psychiatrist, who survived Theresienstadt and Auschwitz and later wrote *Man's Search for Meaning*, taught, "Life is never made unbearable by circumstances, but only by lack of purpose and meaning."

Yes, our lives have changed, and we all feel frustrated and powerless to make a difference. But not being able to do all we wish to do should never stop us from acting as Frankl urged, with purpose and meaning to do whatever we can.

- Let us do all we can to remain healthy. Hand washing, sanitizing and physical distancing, cannot be optional.
- Drink plenty of water, eat healthy foods and try to get sufficient sleep.
- Seek new ways in our enforced leisure to keep our minds occupied.
- Reach out with phone calls, emails and letters to those who are alone.
- Donate what you can to organizations that make a difference.

In recent weeks I have released \$1,000 of my Discretionary Fund to F.I.S.H. because my experience on the Island has shown me how efficiently and effectively they use the funds we contribute to them.

As a congregation, *Bat Yam* was the first on the Island to announce a switch from in-person events to digital activities to remain connected and offer comfort to our members and the wider community.

We all owe a debt of gratitude to our technological wizards, Michael Samet, Ron and Janice Chaddock, Don Breiter, Garry Weiss and Dave Waks for making possible our *Shabbat* Welcome, *Shabbat* Morning classes and our Wednesday Coffee Hour. I shudder to think where we would be without them.

A special shoutout goes to Dave Waks, who worked tirelessly for hours with Cantor Simon and myself to ensure our Passover *seder* would go well.

The effort paid off. Our *seder* reached homes from Hawaii to Germany. Our other offerings reach far more people in more places than those who were able to attend in person before the current crisis.

Recently, many of us learned that the famous song "Over the Rainbow" was not just written to express a little girl's hope to escape Kansas in the 1939 movie, *The Wizard of Oz.*

Rather, the song's Jewish composers, Harold Arlen (nee Hyman Arluck) and Yip Harburg (nee Isidore Hochberg) had something greater in mind. Seeing the storm clouds gathering over Europe after *Kristallnacht* they were dreaming of land over "the rainbow" of their people's suffering: Israel.

As we confront the changes in our lives the coronavirus has wrought, I am so proud that *Bat Yam* is looking "over the rainbow." With people stepping forward to meet the current challenge with courage and creativity, we shall soon "wake up with the clouds far behind" to embrace a bright and sunny future.



Shavuot – the Festival of Weeks

"The Time of the Giving of the *Torah*"

The Festival of *Shavuot is* the festival holiday occurring 50 days after Passover begins (Pentacost), on which we traditionally celebrate the giving of the *Torah* to the Jewish People standing at the foot of Mt. Sinai. It is unlike other Jewish holidays in that it has no prescribed *mitzvoth* (*Torah* commandments) other than traditional festival observances of meals (especially dairy foods) and merriment and the traditional holiday observances of special prayer services and the required abstention from work. However, it is also characterized by many *minhagim* (customs). One of these customs is the recitation of *Yizkor* (Prayers of Remembrance) – which is recited only four times a year.

Please be well and stay healthy through these next few months until we see each other again in the fall. Zei Gezunt!



TECHNOLOGY SUPPORT COMMITTEE

The *Bat Yam* we know and love today is not the *Bat Yam* that was started in 1991. To be sure, neither is the state of the world, nor the challenges we face in running our congregation. To meet these challenges, we, like the rest of the world, need to rely on the newest, most powerful digital technologies.

Over time, *Bat Yam* has increased its technological capabilities. As you know, we already make use of the audio and video projection system at SCUCC to enhance our Friday *Shabbat* service during the winter months. Our Rabbi, President and Board of Directors communicate with the members via the regular use of email. *Bat Yam*, as an organization, communicates with the rest of the world via the Internet and its website, www.batyam.org.

Just a few short years ago, *Bat Yam* hardly used email, and our website was just a direct post of the newsletter. Nevertheless, those two pieces of technology were deemed sufficient to meet most of our internal and external communications needs.

But today, both external events and internal growth and innovation require us to place greater reliance and emphasis on new digital technologies. Our newest use of technology includes Zoom conferencing and Facebook Live for live *Shabbat Welcome* broadcasts and Zoom for Saturday morning *Torah* classes and Coffee with the Rabbi on Wednesdays.

Clearly, it is imperative that we continue to improve and upgrade our use of these technologies, both for your benefit and the administration of the synagogue. To that end, *Bat Yam* has created a new Technology Support Committee, reporting to the Board of Directors. The committee consists of Don Breiter, Ron Chaddock, Janice Block Chaddock, Mike Samet (Chair), Dave Waks, and Gary Weiss. These individuals bring a broad array of tech knowledge and capability to the table. Our goal is to create a formal way of providing *Bat Yam* members, clergy, and administrators with the technology and support that will make the organization run efficiently, powerfully, productively and enjoyably, focusing on technologies for the running of religious services, classes, meetings, and events; communications and Internet applications; and the administration of the institution.

Of course, we are continuing to run our email and <u>batyam.org</u> website services, and we look forward to seeing continuing improvements there. Over the next few months, the committee will be looking at various technologies to enhance all aspects of our *Bat Yam* experience, including Internet service within the SCUCC building; video, computer and Internet access during Saturday classes; and other electronics for various events during the year. We will be exploring the setting up of some form of "Help Desk" for all of this technology.

TZEDAKAH COMMITTEE

The *Tzedakah* committee, which includes Nancy Greenberg, Nessa Adelson, Debbie Gurman, and Vickie Fuchs, would like to thank all those congregants who made donations to the *Tzedakah* fund during the 2019-2020 season. With your help, we were able to make donations on behalf of *Bat Yam Temple of the Islands* to the following:

- Yad La Kashish, an organization that provides food, transportation and art activities to elderly citizens of Israel.
- Leket Israel, an organization that benefits Israelis and particularly children who are at
 risk. The money will be used toward an initiative that rescues surplus meals from IDF
 bases, corporate cafeterias, and Israel hotel chains for redistribution to high schools and
 after-school programs for children at high risk. The children get food that would otherwise be wasted.
- NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness). The project our donation will go toward is mental health first aid classes for one youth, one adult and one public-safety person.
- **Jewish War Veterans of Southwest Florida**. Our funds will go toward visits to VA hospitals, care for homeless veterans and care packages for Jewish soldiers.
- **Holocaust Museum and Education Center**, which works with youth to teach about prejudice and to prevent antisemitism.
- ACT (Abuse, Counseling and Treatment), which provides safe, confidential and free services to victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking and their children. Services include safe emergency shelter, individual and group counseling for adults and children, a 24-hour hotline, and educational outreach in schools and children's programs.

- The Harry Chapin Food Bank of Southwest Florida operates an In-school Pantry Program
 on 10 school campuses. Schools are selected based on the highest percentages of
 students qualifying for subsidized meal programs. The food bank stocks the pantry with
 shelf-stable foods and, when possible, fresh produce.
- Quality of Life Center provides youth development programs for at-risk students. They
 use a research-based model and track each student to provide tutoring in areas of
 individual need.

From the Green Team

The Green Team is an official committee of Sanibel Congregational UCC dedicated to helping the congregation keep the church covenant, which says in part, "We will serve and support each other and do all we can to protect as well the birds, animals and plants on this fragile barrier island." Congregants from Bat Yam work on the Green Team's programs, and more are welcome to engage in educational and advocacy efforts.

Jean Chandler of SCUCC's Green Team submitted an excerpt from an April 13, 2020, *New Yorker* article by Kate Brown, "The Pandemic Is not a Natural Disaster." Included below are some of the article's salient points.

COVID-19 is an ecological disaster, as well as a public health crisis. The interconnectedness of our biological lives is pushing us to reconsider our understanding of the natural world. Our picture of the human body is shifting, too. It seems less like a self-contained vessel, defined by one's genetic code and ruled by a brain, than like a microbial ecosystem swept along in atmospheric currents, harvesting gases, bacteria, phages, fungal spores, and airborne toxins in its nets.

Infectious diseases are only one aspect of a larger, ongoing health emergency. Two-thirds of cancers have their origins in environmental toxins, accounting for millions of annual fatalities; annually 4.2 million people die from complications of respiratory illnesses caused by airborne toxins – 45,000 in the U.S. alone. Pollution from the shutdown of factories in Wuhan has been shown to have saved between 51,000-73,000 lives in China – twenty times more people than the virus has killed in Hubei province as of March 8.

This is an occasion for thinking in broad terms – pesticides from tropical banana plantations end up in Lake Superior. The air helps pollinate our plants; it also transports radioactive particles, fungal spores, bacteria and viruses. The quality of our air matters; reducing pollution in Manhattan by just one unit of particulate matter could have saved hundreds of lives.

Self-isolation is key if we are to stop the pandemic. Isolation is in itself an acknowledgement of our deep integration with our surroundings. Ms. Brown ends by saying, "To fully respond to what's happened, we need to reflect on the worldwide ecological networks that bind all of us together."
