RABBI FUCHS REFLECTS



What We Celebrate on Rosh Hashanah

"Hayom harat Olam!" "This is the day of the world's birth," we proclaim each time we hear the Shofar's blast! It is the central message of Rosh Hashanah: to celebrate the teachings and ideals of Genesis' magnificent Creation Story.

"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth," our *Torah* begins. So many ask: How could God have created the world in seven days? What about the dinosaurs and evolution? Don't we believe in that?

Of course we believe in that!
The creation story in Genesis
does not offer a scientific
account of HOW the world was
created. It is rather an
exquisite religious poem

offering insight as to WHY we are here.

The biblical authors were not interested in writing science. The truths of the creation story are the religious ideas that it sets forth – ideas upon which all subsequent Jewish thought depends.

The first assumption of the story is that God is behind creation. However the world came to be our story contends that a single, good caring God initiated the process. God acted with purpose and meaning. Therefore, our lives have purpose and meaning.

The story also reminds us that we human beings are in charge of and responsible for the world. Until the text begins to tell of the creation of humanity the method by which God creates is simple: God said, "Let there be..." and the next step in creation unfolds.

With human beings, God's method changes. "And God said: "Let us create humanity in our image after our likeness. And they shall rule the fish of the sea, the birds of the air on the cattle and all the earth and everything that creeps on the earth." And God created us human beings – male and female – in the Divine

Image." (Genesis 1:26) That does not mean that we look like God; God has no shape or form. It means that we human beings have God-like powers, and the Almighty puts us in charge of and responsible for the earth. It is an awesome power, and we can use it for good or for ill.

The *Midrash (Bereshit Rabbah* 8:11) teaches that we human beings stand midway between God and the rest of the animals. Like the animals we eat, sleep, drink, procreate, eliminate our waste and die. But in a God-like way we have the power to think, analyze, create and shape the environment in ways that far surpass any other creature.

Only humans can mine ore from a mountain, and turn the ore into iron, the iron into steel and with that steel forge the most delicate of surgical instruments to heal and to save lives. But only humans can mine the same ore to fashion bombs and bullets whose only purpose is to kill and to maim.

Finally, the Creation Story introduces the concept of *Shabbat*, a weekly day to step back from our strivings and contemplate how we can better fulfill God's charge to us to make a better world.

Genesis' Creation Story makes no pretense of being scientific. It teaches the core values of our tradition. It teaches that God entrusts the earth to our care, and it warns us, as the *Midrash* (*Ecclesiastes Rabbah* 7:13) reminds us: This is the only earth we will get.

The message of *Rosh Hashanah* is that we must care for the earth God entrusted to our care and work – each of us in our own way – to create on it, a just, caring and compassionate society.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



As we usher in the Jewish New year 5779, I am filled with great trepidation. When I reflect on this past year, starting with the march in Charlottesville, I worry about our future, our children and grandchildren. Some in the political world chose to embolden the extremists, encouraging them to express their hate speech and validating their attacks on various groups in our society.

From 1860 to 1920, America became the melting pot, and millions of immigrants came to this paradise seeking safety and security and to escape religious and political wars and famine. Yet, there were times when America turned its back, and the immigration laws of the 20's were a prime example. This bill restricted the numbers of people, including Asians, Jews and other minorities. The author went further and suggested we need to bring in more people from Nordic countries.

Following the defeat of Hitler and other like-minded despots, most Jews

felt that anti-Semitism had been eradicated, and we began the rebuilding process. The next seven decades saw the growth of our community and the birth of Israel.

Anti-Semitism had not disappeared, and today the divisions in our society have turned our country asunder. Too often we have given up focusing on the root issues and discussing them in a meaningful fashion. The Annual ADL audit of anti-Semitic incidents for 2017 noted that the number reported was up by 60%. Also, their analysts had counted an appalling 4.2 million anti-Semitic tweets.

My plea to all of us, regardless of what side of the political spectrum we are on, is that we MUST speak up to change the tone and content of our dialogue.

I leave you with the words of our first president, George Washington, who responded to a letter from the leader of the Touro Synagogue in Newport, Rhode Island, who was worried about similar issues. Washington quoted from the Bible: "Every one shall sit in safety under his own vine and fig tree. and there shall be none to make him afraid" "For happily the government of the United States gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance, requires only that they who live under its protection should demean themselves as good citizens, in giving it on all occasions their effectual support."



LET US DECLARE THE AWESOMENESS OF THIS DAY..." (High Holy Day Prayer Book)



I am very excited to be joining Rabbi Fuchs and the *Bat Yam* community this year as your cantor for High Holy Days. The liturgy for these services is most complicated and challenging. For example, the *T'filah* for the *Yamin N'ra-im* ("The Days of Awe") is the longest one of the year. There are many insertions of *piyyutim* or complex medieval poetry in the High Holy Day prayer book that are very obtuse. How can we come together as a praying community at services that are the least familiar to us?

I assert that it is the function of the music and the beautiful musical motifs of the High Holy Days that can bring us together as a praying community. Some of the melodies of the High Holy Days are so venerable that they are called "mi-Sinai" tunes - -which is to say that they seem to have originated at Mt. Sinai with Moses. We know that this is not the case, but the melody for *Kol Nidre*, for example, which dates back to medieval times as well as many other High Holy Day melodic motifs, is certainly centuries old. These musical themes, expressing by turn every mood of the Jewish soul, constitute a veritable symphony in the service. Let us welcome the New Year of 5779 with joyous and inspirational song. May it be one of good health, contentment and fulfillment for you and all your loved ones. Toby joins me in wishing all of you a *Shanah Tovah!*
